CAMPUS HOUSING DOES TURNABOUT

To meet Trevecca's expected overflow enrollment, campus housing has undergone a complete turnabout. This year the women will occupy the Georgia, Johnson and Tennessee dormitories; while the men will take up residence in Wise Hall, McKay Hall, Bud Robinson and the New Dormitory Complex (formerly the Married Students Units).

Tennessee and Johnson will house approximately 100 girls each; Georgia will house approximately 120 girls. Wise Hall and Robinson will accommodate 48 men each, McKay Hall 53, and the New Dorm Complex 108. Married couples will occupy the 30 unit section of the New Dorm Complex.

The men occupying the 20 unit New Dorm Complex were those originally destined for residence in Tennessee, but had to move to make way for the girls moving into Tennessee, who in turn had to move to make way for the men moving into McKay and Robinson, who in turn had to make way for

the maintenance equipment being moved from Hardy Hall to Tidwell Hall.

The above resulted when the much-needed "facelifting of McKay and Tidwell" proved too costly. Rather than spend the extra money it was decided to close down Tidwell and make the necessary improvements in McKay. The idea then to utilize Tidwell as storage for maintenance equipment will expedite the removal of Hardy Hall as the leading campus eyesore. (It must be noted here that Mr. Beal and his Bookstore will first be moved to the area of McClurken basement).

The Administration and Staff have gone to great lengths to improve the conditions of the rooms and dormitories, including carpeting the lounges of Tennessee, Georgia and Johnson. Overall, their feeling has been to "change the complexion of student housing" and to make dormitory conditions as "liveable and pleasing as possible."



TNC Gets Dress Code

On May 21, 1971 the Administrative Council adopted the following guidelines to go into effect September, 1971 for student dress and appearance. This came as a result of a study and recommendations by students, faculty, and administrators of Trevecca Nazarene College. These guidelines are not intended to be all-inclusive of a student's appearance. Responsible students have in the past, and we believe will in the future, respect the integrity and considered judgment of the College and its constituency.

DRESS

As members of a Christian community it is our high privilege to always exert a positive influence for good in conduct and dress. Good appearance is an asset on any occasion. Dress is significant because it says so much about us. Therefore, the Trevecca student wishes at all times to avoid the "Hippie" image which is associated with the modern drug culture. To implement the image of Christian simplicity, modesty and appropriateness, we have given these guidelines, and will expect adherence thereto.

FOR MEN:

1. Hair length — Should not extend below the top of the coat collar. Lower half of ear must show. Sideburns, mustaches and beards, if worn, should be neatly trimmed and clean.

2. Clothing: Must be neat, reasonable and appropriate for a Christian College. Shirts — Must wear. Cut-off shirts not permitted; sleeveless shirts not permitted. Shoes — Must be worn at all times on campus. Bare feet not allowed. Shorts and cut-off trousers are not permitted for campus wear.

3. Appropriateness: For dress-up social events, Sunday and special events, suitable attire (suits or sport coats and ties) should be worn. Prescribed athletic attire is to be worn only in connection with physical education classes, Intramural program, and other permissible athletic activities. Sun-bathing is not permitted on the campus grounds but is limited to designated areas. Cleanliness of body and clothing is expected at all times.

FOR WOMEN:

Trevecca's young ladies have both the privilege and responsibility for setting the style of Christian example on campus. In keeping with this, the following guidelines are to be observed:

1. Clothing: The attire worn should avoid the appearance of nudity and any suggestion of sensuality. Co-ordinated pant-suits are permissible for spectators at athletic events, after 7:00 p.m. and on Saturdays. Appropriate slacks are permitted for campus wear on Saturdays until evening meal time. Any other occasion must be by special permission from the Office of the Dean of Student Affairs. Tight-fitting slacks, shorts, bermuda shorts, cut-offs and extreme mini-skirts, as well as similar attire, are not permitted. Shoes — Must be worn at all times on campus. Bare feet not allowed.
2. Appropriateness of dress is very important. Clothing must be neat, reasonable and specifically suitable for a Christian College. Cleanliness of body and clothing is expected. Prescribed athletic attire is to be worn only in connection with physical education classes, the Intramural program and other permissible athletic events. Sun-bathing is not permitted on the campus grounds, but is limited to designated areas.

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Test Dates and Site
for Graduate Record
Examinations Announced

Undergraduates and others preparing to go to graduate school may take the Graduate Record Examinations on any of six different test dates during the current academic year. The site of the testing for all six dates will be Vanderbilt University.

The first testing date for the GRE is October 23, 1971. Students planning to register for the October test date are advised that applications received by the Educational Testing Service after October 5 will incur a \$3.50 late registration fee. After October 8, there is no guarantee that applications for the October test date can be processed. The other five test dates are December 11, 1971, January 15, February 26, April 22, and June 17, 1972.

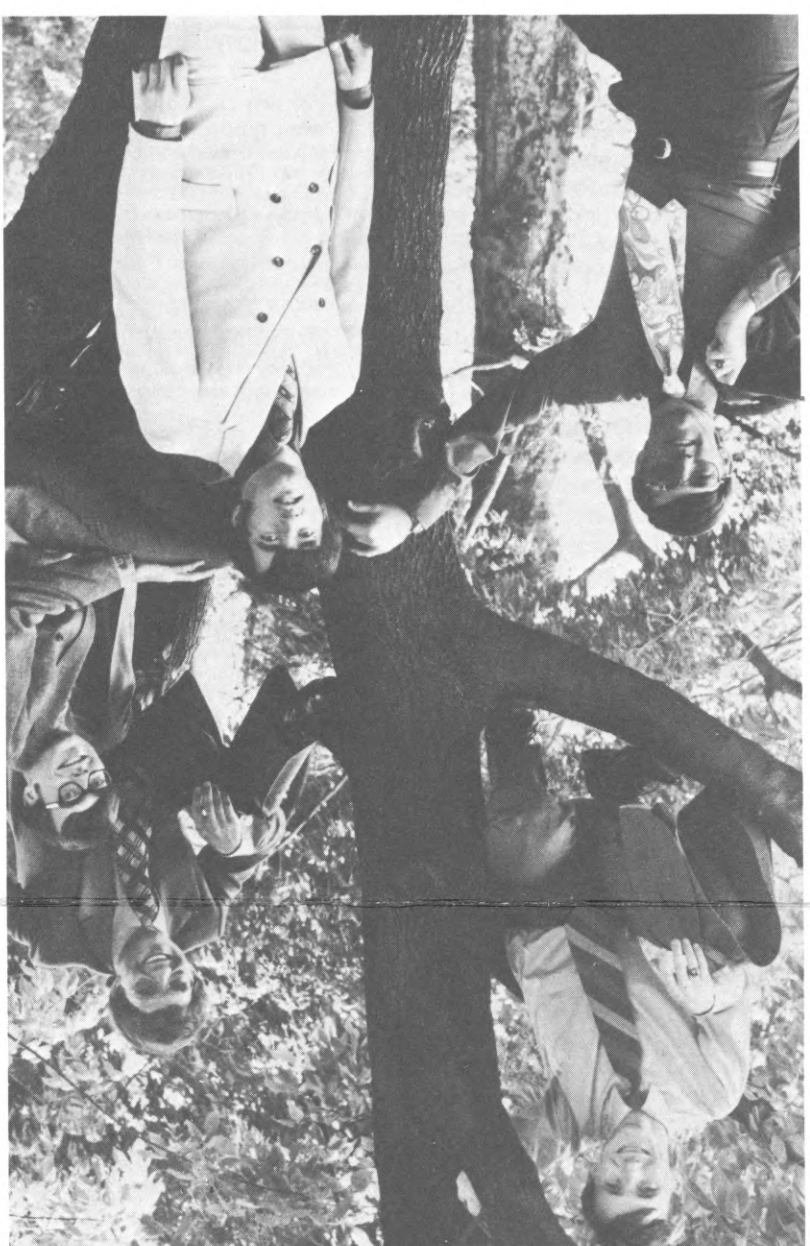
The GRE includes an Aptitude Test of general scholastic ability and Advanced Tests measuring achievement in 19 major fields of study. Full details and registration forms for the GRE are contained in the *Bulletin*. The *Bulletin* also contains GRE scores already on file with requesting transcript service on forms and instructions for more the 16,000 miles and will always stand out in my mind as one of the highlights of my four years at Trevcca.

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
