Immediately after "Brother Bob" began to preach, he had the


eyes, ears, and souls of everyone in chapel tuned into his frequency; and, whether or not you had heard of him before, you knew why he was here.


"If God tells you to do it, that's a want-to" echoed through all of Rev. Harrington's talks to the student body.

NEW CLASS OFFERED AT TREVECCA

The 1973-74 Curriculum Catalog states that a major in Business is offered, with the executive secretarial course as one course of study leading to the Bachelor of Science degree. It also states that "this type of major provides the graduate with a broad liberal arts background: courses of business such as economics, accounting, and business law; plus the basic secretarial skills." Furthermore, Trevecca is known to be the "college with something extra." Yet, many times a student entering the business field may feel apprehensive when it comes to the direct application of learned skills. For this reason, the department of economics and business administration, headed by Mr. Gerald Skinner, has in the experimental stage a secretarial internship program for honor students majoring in business education or executive secretarial areas.

The new program, which provides on-the-job experience, allows up to nine hours of credit, and is on a basis of three segments during the year. First, is the erudition of the IBM Word Processing Center. Second, is the supervisory program where a student trains another student and evaluates his secretarial skills. Third is the actual office performance, which is the key to the program. It is in the third stage that students answer the telephone, do filing, take dictation, and complete miscellaneous projects.

Classes are like other courses in that students pay tuition and get a grade. However, it is unlike other courses in that there are no lectures. Students are evaluated on performance. There is something new each quarter, and there is a regular wage. Presently, there are six girls enrolled in this new program at Trevecca. They are selected according to completion of requirements of intermediate and advanced typing and according to the approval of the instructor.

Through this internship program students should find that acquiring a job upon graduation is much easier. For not only is there an acquisition of skills, but also an experience in human relations desired by prospective employers.

TNC Accreditation Extended

Trevecca Nazarene College has been granted a ten year extension on her accreditation after study and reaffirmation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Other institutions in line for extension were required to make adjustments and take corrective procedures in various areas before the extension would be made. Trevecca was granted the extension without any conditions.

This action is considered a major victory of the college and reaffirms the substantial progress in academic programs and in the physical plant during the past few years.

Portrayed were four famous women of history: Nellie Bly, the first woman U.S. journalist in the

nineteenth century; Eleanor of Acquitaine, the twelfth century Queen of France; Maria Montessori, Italy's first woman doctor famous for her work with the mentally deficient; and Emmeline Pankhurst, the pioneer British suffragist who obtained full vote for women in 1928. All great women, women without whom the life of the modern female would have become distinctly different.

All research, writing and costume designs were done by Miss Bach herself, and any changes of costume were performed right on stage as she brought each character to life.

Pantomime, voice and facial expressions are all necessary elements of a good character actress - and Miss Bach had them all, making the transition from American, to British, to Italian accents with amazing clarity.

Her warmth and friendliness radiated to the audience to such a degree that each individual felt part of the action, living the actual moment with her. She and the audience were made one - and their applause of appreciation were her reward for a fantastic and flawless performance.

Miss Bach travels the United States and Canada with her one woman shows, appearing before colleges, universities, forums and varied organizations. A Chicagoan, she attended Carleton College and was graduated from Northwestern University. She is listed in Who's Who of American Women, Who's Who in the Midwest, and received the 1971 Career Achievement Award of the Chicago Area Professional Pan Hellenic Association. She is also co-director of Chappell-Bach Associates in Chicago which specializes in writing, directing and producing theatrical productions.



BEYOND SENTIMENTALITY

I would like to share with you some ideas that have come to have significant meaning for me. They are nothing new or spectacular but rather personal insights from my experience that have helped me to become a more free and expressive person. They came through intense creative struggle and have become a process in my life, nothing fixed or settled but something fluid and dynamic.

I used to believe that it wasn't good enough to simply be sincere. There was always the possibility of being sincerely wrong and that very possibility would crumble my already shaken assurance. I was afraid of my feelings, for I had always been told that we were not to trust in our feelings but to just believe. Why? Because it was so. But suppose it wasn't so?...

Recently I've come to see that it is not so much that we say the right thing or do the right thing but that we want to do and say what is right. There is a difference. To be a believer does not mean that we

have to ascribe to a particular doctrine or any doctrine for that matter, nor do we have to agree with an orthodox creed; but rather, to be a believer means to be terribly serious about life - to be open and sensitive to that which concerns us ultimately, to be dependably real, to be authentic, to be pure. This is the meaning of sincerity, and it is enough!

Now I have come to trust my experience. I believe that deep within me is an authority more sound than any external imposition. I have come to feel that I am most at home when I carefully listen within, operating independently, not in isolation but in interaction. To be a centered self does not

mean to be self-centered. Self reliance does not imply pure autonomy. It is theonomy, the only fulfillment where we can actualize our deepest feelings and integrate our variety of expression in a meaningful relationship with God. God help us to be sincere!


The second competition will be on February 8th and 9th at East Tennessee State University in Johnson, City. This tournament is the Tennessee state intercollegiate competition, at which all the

The bad weather was just a start of the troubles that lay ahead as the Trojans went to Jackson, Tennessee, January 10th to attack the Bulldogs of Union University. The Trojans were flooded out by the Bulldogs offensive output of 120 points to our 82. The tough Bulldogs were led by No. 34 Larry Million, an ex-Penn State roundballer. The highlight performance was from their high-scoring freshman, Keith Reynolds, with 22 points. As a team, Union shot 49 for 94 from the field for 52 percent, and 22 for 26 at the charity strip for 85 percent. They had 57 rebounds.

For the Trojans, John Evans hustled his way for 21 points, and Ralph Watson shied for 12 rebounds. Field goals for TNC were 35 for 85 for a cold 41 percent, and free throws, 12 for 20 for 60 percent. The team pulled down 42 rebounds.

Trevecca never presented a threat in the ball game. The Bulldogs made the first two buckets. John Evans added two to even up the game. Then it went from there.

Union built up a 67-45 half-time lead-mostly on fast breaks.

Sam Davis said that Union was a very, very fine basketball team. "We just didn't do the things we should have to win."

Lambuth 108 - Trevecca 71

Friday, December 7th, the Trojans found their way to Jackson, Tennessee for a 7:00 p.m. tipoff against a tough group from Lambuth College. It was the first contest between the two schools in an attempt to upgrade the schedule. The Trojans came out on the short end of the 108 to 71 game. The Trojans played a good overall game but were just outclassed by the more experienced Lambuth team.

Johnny "the Machine" Evans produced a 21 point output for the Trojans. Next was Ralph Watson with 13 points and 14 rebounds. Sam Davis also helped Ralph keep the boards clean with 9.

Lambuth placed two men over the 20 point mark with 25 and 22 for

Richey Delk and George Patterson, respectively.

Trevecca shot a cold 36 percent, 31 for 85 from the floor and 60 percent, 9 for 15 at the line. The Trojans pulled more rebounds on the offensive end (26) than on the defensive (17) for a total of 43. The hard luck Trojans held a total of 24 turnovers. The Trojans never did threaten in the game, which saw them underneath 53-39 at intermission.

Lambuth shot 51 percent, 45 for 88 with the shot chart showing most of the 108 points coming from underneath the basket. Free throws, went 18 for 22 for 82 percent. The total rebounds were 52.

TREVECCA 66 - COVENANT 62

While most of the students were at home enjoying their Christmas vacation, ten dedicated Trojans and two coaches spent a few extra days preparing for the last two games of the 1973 portion of the season. The results netted Trevecca its first win on December 6th - on the other hand, another loss.

Playing on their home floor, the Trojans managed to hold off Covenant 66-62. Time seemed to be on the Trojan's side as it exhausted the Covenant attack in the closing minutes. The first half score was 34-24. Trevecca led as much as 30 points at one time of the game.

High point honors went to Ralph Watson with 18, who also snagged 14 rebounds off the boards. Shooting percentages were field goals, 26-53 for 49 percent and free throws, 14-21 for 67 percent. As a team, Trevecca

pulled down 44 rebounds. Plagued all year with turnovers, Trevecca had 28 that night.

Johnny Evans, the flashing guard from Mount Vernon, led the way with 5 assists followed by "Pete" Ridley with 4. The rugged defense of Mike Griner saw him intercept three Covenant passes. Also, because of the scrappy Trojan defense, three Trojans fouled out.

For Covenant, their high scorer was Signorino with 20. Covenant pulled down, as a team, 36 rebounds. Shooting these were 17 for 62, for a rather low 39 percent. At the free throw line, they were 12 for 22 for 39 percent.

This game was an early Christmas gift to all the loyal Trojan supporters in what was almost the year of the Trojans!
