Chapel Speakers Inspire, Challenge


Ding! Dong! The ringing of the bells come as a welcome sound to T. N. C. students because it means chapel time has come again.

All our lives have been made richer from the inspiring words that have fallen from the lips of God's anointed in the past few weeks. From the very beginning of the third week of October every service has been outstanding. Dr. Mackey started off with one of his timely messages the day of Freshman recognition. Following this Dr. Stunck came up with the unusual in a message on the Jewish alphabet with the theme, "Inspiration of the Bible." Using the first six letters of the original alphabet she revealed them to mean ox standing for strength; house beginning salvation at home; camel, signifying traveling to a heavenly home; door showing "I am the way, the truth, and the life"; outlook, looking through the upper window; and hook illustrating the gospel as a hook to catch men.

The next day Dr. Adams presented a logical message using the theme of "The Beauty of the Middle of the Road." It was a wonderful message for practical Christian living. He discussed such questions as, "How spiritual is our church?" "What should recreation for Christians consist of?" etc.

The next two days we were privileged to have two visiting evangelists in the city. The first, Rev. Austin Watson, favored us with a solo, "The Love of God," playing his own accompaniment, and then showed us he could preach too by delivering a timely message from the ninth chapter of Ezekiel with the theme, "I Was Left." Rev. Trafton Williams of Texas presented a unique message with the title of "A Tourist or a Missionary." This was a message that should have inspired all young people present to determine to set higher goals for their life.

The fourth week of October has also been times of blessing. The week was crowned by a message from Rev. E. E. Hale, head of the Nazarene colored school in Institute, West Virginia. Our hearts were burdened more for the colored

Vocal numbers were by the members of the freshman class. These were interspersed between Miss Applegate's numbers with the following freshmen doing the performing:


- Gloria Corey — "The Lord's Prayer"

Jane's contribution to Trevecca is no little one. She has offered inspiration to many discouraged students through her unwillingness to be defeated.

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

Eagles Win 18 to 7


Over Hi School

Freshmen Tie High School


The oft-defeated Freshmen won a moral victory Tuesday by coming from behind to gain a 12 to 12 tie with the high school team.
