

"It Was the Best of Times, It Was the Worst of Times"

On the evening of January 25th a forum was held. The subject was on the matter of Biblical Eschatology (end times); especially in reference to Dr. Dunning's message in chapel on the 23rd on Biblical Prophecy and its relevance to the Middle East situation.

In the forum, Dr. Dunning said that the early Church of the Nazarene and many other holiness movements refused to take a position on the second coming because they saw any predictions of it as mere speculation and opinion and also they did not consider one's stance on it essential to one's Christianity. In other words, you could still be a Christian if your view on the end times differed with that of someone else especially since "No one knows about that day or hour, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father" (Matt. 24:36). The

Church of the Nazarene still takes no official position. Thus there are different views even within our denomination.

Dr. Dunning said that in order for us to have an objective discussion on eschatology, there were two ground rules that had to be laid. First of all, he said that the only way there can be rational discussion on these issues is at the presuppositional level. If there is not an agreement at this level, we simply talk past each other. He said, "The educated person is not a person without presuppositions, we all have presupposition. The educated person is the person who is aware of his or her presuppositions." The second ground rule was that the discussion must be accompanied by open mindedness on both sides.

Dr. Dunning said that he believed that there were four presuppositions at stake that were critical to talking about the end times.

First and foremost is the issue of revelation; revelation pertaining to how God imparts knowledge to man. He said that his presupposition was synergistic - that there was a giving and a receiving side. He likened God's revelation or self-disclosure to man to that of pouring water into a bottle. The water takes the shape of the bottle it is poured into, so also revelation is given shape by the historical and cultural situation of the people to whom it is given and it is in continuity with what they know. Dr. Dunning said, "A person always talks about the future in terms of what is going on in the present." Everything in biblical prophecy is a projection of the present into the future. An example is of Jonah and Ninevah. In its present situation at the time, Jonah was able to prophesize about Ninevah "Forty more days and the city will be destroyed" (Jonah 3:5). Yet when the future became pres-

ent, the situation changed and the prophecy was not fulfilled because the people had repented. Had the people not repented, then the prophecy would have been fulfilled.

This brings us to the second presupposition that has to do with the issue of history. It was Dr. Dunning's presupposition "that history is not a pre-arranged puppet show, i.e. determined." He said, "You cannot write history in advance. Fulfillment is a hindsight category. We cannot know the exact meaning of prophecy until it has become the past." He said, "However, if history is determined in advance in a detailed way, then by implication petitionary prayer is meaningless."

The third presupposition at stake is a hermeneutical one (one involving interpretation). Dr. Dunning said, "Christians cannot appropriately read the Old Testament as if Jesus has never

come." He said that the first problem the early church faced was the issue of the Old Testament since it was a Jewish book. He said that if you read the Old Testament literally, then it cannot be included in the cannon of scriptures. He said "With Jesus coming, the people of God are defined completely different, not the Jews, but the Church in which all cultural differences are done away with so that anyone who accepts Christ can be of the people of God." He said, "In the Old Testament evil nations stood in the way of an apocalyptic Israel. In the New Testament the evil demonic powers stood in the way, but were overcome through the cross."

The final presupposition is Christological. He said that his presupposition is that the center of Christian theology (beliefs about God) in light of which all theology must proceed is that God has fully and finally revealed Himself see "TIMES" page 2

There is a common belief on campus that every discriminating word uttered will end up in the ears of the Dean of Students. However, in a recent interview with Dr. Randy Carden, the director of counseling services, I discovered that our school does have a system of confidentiality that accommodates students with problems. It does not matter how serious the problem or what number it is in the manual, the student's confidence is always kept.

The counseling center in Jernigan is designed and run with privacy in mind. There is a partition set up so that no one knows whose office a student is entering. If an "enquiring mind" calls

the center and shows concern for a friend, the staff cannot and will not say whether or not the student has been there. The rehearsed reply is "I can neither confirm or deny your question."

There are two counselors who work with the students here at Trevecca. They are Dr. Randy Carden and Professor Joy Wells. The student is their first priority. Both counselors have specific professional guidelines that they are supposed to follow. It comes down to a matter of ethics and neither counselor is willing to risk that.

Any subject may be discussed with our counselors. This includes the subjects most students are concerned with, such as, alcohol or drug abuse, pregnancy and

abortion, and homosexual activity. These topics along with others are held in strict confidence. Even if approached by a dean or the president, a counselor will not divulge information. Dr. Carden went as far to say that if asked to betray his professional ethics by revealing privileged information, he would resign before giving it. Dr. Carden was adamant, throughout the interview, about the extremity of his loyalty to the student who comes to him for help. When asked if he felt uncomfortable with keeping information or if he would give any information without the patient's consent, the answer was "Absolutely, Positively, No!"

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in Jesus Christ and thus becomes the criterion to identify the boundaries of all other issues.

Many of today's popular beliefs about end times comes from dispensationalism, which refers to the theories of John Nelson Darby in Ireland in the 1800's. The problem with his theories and many others like them is that they are based on pre-Christian apocalyptic Jewish literature concerning their prophecies about the Messiah. This literature saw the Messiah coming back with fire and brimstone to wipe out the evil nations of the world and set up an earthly throne. It is for this very reason that Mark's Gospel shows that Jesus refused to be associated with the term Messiah and in John's Gospel why he wouldn't let the crowd come and make him king by force. Here is a man who could supply your army with plenty of food from just fishes and loaves; if people in your army got injured, he could cure them; if they were killed in

battle, he could raise them from the dead. The Jews rejected Christ because to them a crucified Messiah was a stumbling block (and foolishness to Gentiles) (1 Cor. 1:23). This is why Peter rebuked Jesus after claiming him to be Messiah, and that's why Jesus replied, "Get behind me Satan (Adversary)! You do not have in mind the things of God, but the things of men" (Mark 8:33). That is also why Jesus replied to the Pharisee on the coming of God's kingdom, "The kingdom of God does not come with your careful observation, nor will people say, 'Here it is,' or 'There it is,' because the kingdom of God is within you" (Luke 17:20-21). The kingdom of heaven in the New Testament is seen as here now and yet becoming; a coming together of heaven and earth; a process of reconciliation (2 Cor. 5:16-21) that started with Christ coming and his death on the cross. That's why Jesus told a James and John who were

looking for an earthly position in the kingdom that they did not know what they were asking for when they asked to sit at his right and left. Luke shows us who was at his right and left when the thief said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom" and Jesus replied, "I tell you the truth, today you will be with me in paradise" (Luke 23:42-43).

As Christians we believe in Christ's return and the judgment, but even if there are wars and rumors of wars and persecution, Christ did say that such things would happen before He returned; therefore we should live responsibly until then and not sit around waiting for Him to come since He might come like a thief in the night and catch us watching and not working. Dr. Hal Cauthron (now in Swaziland, Africa) used to say that if men got Christ's coming wrong the first time, they probably have it wrong the second time also.

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Where does our \$\$\$\$MONEY\$\$\$ Go?

I know that students here at Trevecca and probably at most colleges around the country like nothing better than to sit around and complain about the cost of college. Colleges charge the poor students astronomical amounts of money for just a simple thing like an education. Students, or maybe parents, are putting all this money into the school, but where is the money going? Is college a rip-off or is higher tuition a necessity?

M.L. White, Chief Fiscal Officer of Trevecca, was able to answer these questions along with many of the other questions that students have concerning the cost of college. The educational and general revenue of the college comes from three different sources. Seventy-two percent of the revenue comes from the students themselves. This includes tuition, private instructional fees, and general fees. Nineteen percent comes from church

educational budgets. The other nine percent comes from sources as individual corporate matching gifts, WNAZ fundraising, vending machine income, and any other fundraising done through the college.

The income of the college is then used for expenses in seven different areas. Forty-two percent of the revenue is used for instructional expenses. These expenses include faculty salaries, departmental secretaries, and office supplies. Two and one-half percent goes toward academic support. This includes the deans' salaries, travel expenses, academic commuting, and tutors. Five percent of the revenue goes toward library services. This money buys books, magazines, computers, library supplies, and pays the salaries of the staff. Student services receives twelve percent of the revenue. This is used for expenses in the areas of admissions and recruitment. S.G.A.

used for scholarships, fellowships and anything else underwritten by the college.

Trevecca also has certain auxiliary services such as the dorm the cafeteria, the snack shoppe, the bookstore, and the post office. The money that is earned from these services goes back into them. The money is used to keep them running or to improve their services.

Although it seems that our tuition is very high, I realize now that it takes high tuition to keep a college running smoothly. Even with tuition as it is now, it is hard to make ends meet. It takes approximately eleven million dollars a year just to keep a college running. If any campus improvements need to be made, Trevecca has to rely on private contributions. It is a hard job running this school. I had no idea of all of the various areas covered by school revenue. I guess students just don't think about them before complaining.

This spring, April 18-20th, the Theatrical Arts Club of Trevecca (T.A.C.T.) and the Music Department, in conjunction with the Lyceum Committee, will present the infamous satirical, romantic operetta, "The Pirates of Penzance" by Gilbert and Sullivan. "The Pirates of Penzance" was written in the late 19th century and in part was a satire directed against Queen Victoria of England who, having very little sense of humor, was not in the least bit amused. 




Becker Wins Australian Open

Boris Becker is the newest and latest No. 1 men's players in the tennis world after winning the \$4 million Australian Open held Jan 12-26 in Flinders Park, Melbourne. The 22 year old West German defeated two-time winner Ivan Lendl in an entertaining and hard-hitting final 1-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4. But for how long?

With the current competition between Becker, Stefan Edberg, Lendl and Andre Agassi, the No. 1 position has become something of a misnomer. Last year Edberg won Wimbledon and the Masters tournament, but lost dismally in the first rounds of both the US and French titles. Yet because nobody else seemed to conjure up a season of real consistency (Agassi never entered Wimbledon, Lendl never entered the French and Becker couldn't even capture one of the majors) the Swede was arguable regarded by many (including the ATP players tours) as numero uno.

So how long for Becker? Well considering the depth and com-

petition current in men's tennis (remembering also that Becker lost the first round at the French to the then unheralded Goran Ivanisevic) nobody, including the German Wunderkind, is promising our domination. Edberg had only begun to enjoy the aura of No. 1 before the trip down-under, and now he is without it.

For Mats Wilander the 1988 stigma of No. 1 resulted in a complete loss of motivation and 2 1/2 years down the road he is struggling to stay in the world's top 100, but that's tennis.

It says much about the standard of men's tennis that there is such uncertainty about who, in 1991, will end up on top. Boris is a realist and whilst he has won the first grand slam of the year, past experiences have taught him that, with success, there are also drawbacks. But with the right attitude this could be the real year for the man who won Wimbledon at age 17, and has been admired ever since.

Coach Altopp - a Positive Attribute

Taking a quick glance through the ranks of Trevecca's baseball team and noting the considerable jump to conclusions and number of "FR" tags, you might doubt a successful Trojan baseball season. But that would be under-estimating the abilities of Athletic Director and baseball coach Dr. David Altopp.

Altopp arrived at Trevecca at the beginning of last fall in a rather messy and transitional state of Trevecca baseball. Elliot Johnson had just departed and so, too, had many of his players. In fact, no less than 8 senior players graduated from Trevecca and left a very sizable hole in the program.


The only option available to Altopp within limited time? Recruit, and fast! That he did, and six months later, Trevecca's baseball program appears on a

healthy, albeit inexperienced, level of talent and discipline.

Whatever record Trevecca baseball attains this Spring season, David Altopp is sure to get the best out of his players and lead them by example. If nothing else, his baseball players will know the meaning of starving and having to get to training at 6 AM!


