

Youth In Mission Interviewing

The staff of NYI Ministries from Nazarene Headquarters will be on campus October 17-18 to interview for 1991 YOUTH IN MISSION ministry opportunities. YOUTH IN MISSION, sponsored through NYI Ministries, gives young adults, ages 18-30, an opportunity to serve in summer and one to two year mission assignments in locations all over the world.

On Wednesday, October 17, a special chapel service will introduce the program and its components, locations for 1991, and provide a chance for interested TNC students to sign up for interview times. Interviews will begin that afternoon and continue through Thursday, October 18.

World Mission will again be the theme during the chapel on Thursday, October 18. A special film titled "Seoul Food" will be presented which highlights the General Church of the Nazarene sponsored

Thrust to the Cities program to Seoul, Korea.

The opportunities for YOUTH IN MISSION in 1991 include the following:

MISSION TO THE CITIES

- Teams of four members work in selected North American cities in cooperation with local outreach programs. MISSION TO THE CITIES teams minister to children, teens, and adults. They may also be involved in some compassionate ministry opportunities. Target cities for 1991 are Indianapolis, Toronto, Ft. Worth, San Francisco, New York, Honolulu, Orlando, Montreal, Birmingham, and Chicago.

CONTACT - This ministry program bears its name because it is designed to do just what it implies—build contacts with unchurched children and their families and then introduce those families to a local church. CONTACT team members learn skills in pup-

petry, music, crafts, teaching, and evangelism to help them impact the lives of children. During the summer of 1991, possible locations include Nashville, Sacramento, Canada West, Canada Pacific, Northwest Oklahoma, and Washington Pacific.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT MINISTRIES

- Participants assigned to ISM teams will travel overseas and work with missionaries and national leaders to reach those parts of the world for Jesus Christ. ISM teams will learn an assortment of skills and cross-cultural techniques designed to help them communicate the gospel and through the love of Christ to those they meet. Tentative ISM ministry locations include France, Mexico, Ecuador, Korea, Portugal, the republic of Ireland, the British Isles, the English Caribbean, Martinique, Guatemala, and Germany.

RESPONSE is a scholar-

ship program to help develop mission programs on each Nazarene college university's region. The program offers varied ministry opportunities during the summer months for college students to serve in support ministries in local churches. Applications for the YOUTH IN MISSION ministry must be made directly with the RESPONSE director on campus, Rev. Joe Bowers.

ADVANCE is a volunteer mission opportunity designed for young adults to age 30 who have a desire to invest in a longer-term mission assignment. Participants are placed for a period of one to two years. ADVANCE options include North America and overseas.

ADVANCE—NORTH AMERICA - Participants focus on discipling and outreach to all age groups. Locations vary from inner-city mission work to suburban.

North American ADVANCE opportunities are available in such locations as Los Angeles, New York, For Worth, Toronto, San Francisco, Orlando, Indianapolis, and Honolulu.

ADVANCE—OVERSEAS - Participants work with missionaries and/or national leaders in dynamic growth areas. Target overseas ADVANCE locations include Portugal, Ecuador, Korea, the English Caribbean, the British Isles, the Republic of Ireland, Mexico, Paris, Brazil, Japan, New Zealand, Samoa, Venezuela, Suriname, Costa Rica, Philippines, New Guinea, Thailand, and Guatemala.

YOUTH IN MISSION is made possible through the cooperation of Nazarene Youth International Ministries, the Divisions of World Mission and Church Growth at Nazarene Headquarters, and leaders throughout the Church of the Nazarene.

P.N.G. is Papua New Guinea. It is a small island-nation just above Australia. It is made up of about 4 million people of melanesian (dark-skinned) origin who abruptly left their own stone age about sixty years ago. Today, you find quite a mixture (and sometimes a clash) between the old and the new.

I've been in P.N.G. for ten months now as a Nazarene In Volunteer Service (NIVS). I live in the Highlands of P.N.G. at a place called Ningeii (Ningae). I teach classes, work in the library, and also do computer work here at Tuman Nazarene Bible College.

Living and working here at the Bible College with the missionaries is quite different from what you might expect, but it is very fulfilling. Over the next few months, I hope to share with you in this column a few of the things I have learned since coming to P.N.G.

Jesus said, "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God."

(Mark 10:29, NIV) There is no doubt in my mind that God has a special concern for the poor in this world. Nevertheless, I wish to focus on God's concern for the rich. God is not willing that any should fall away, yet many of us refuse to give up things that cause barriers between ourselves and our Creator.


The most important thing in the issue of poverty is not how much we have, but how much we are willing to give away. (By the way, these two things may be more related than we might like to think.) Nevertheless, I wish to look at the latter. The Bible says that Jesus "loved" the rich young ruler, but the young man turned away from that Love because he could not part with his possessions. Are we willing and able to part with ours? Are we seeking God's Kingdom first and trusting Him to supply our needs?

Phineas F. Bresee said, "We are poor—yes, and I trust the Lord will keep us poor. Anybody who can make

money and get rich is not fit to be a Pentecostal Nazarene. If a man is worthy of the cause, he will pour his money out." (Nazarene Messenger, 6/18/08 Vol.12, p.1) we've come a long way, baby! Bresee realized that the pain of the world was not going to be soothed by monetary balm. the people of the world need the love and joy of Christ shared with them, not money. This might draw one to the conclusion that we of the "blessed" nations might as well keep our money, right?

Wrong! Injustice towards the rest of the world is only a secondary problem. Injustice to ourselves as new creatures in Christ is sin. The money that we hoard is not hurting the rest of the world nearly as much as it is hurting us ourselves. If we are really going to call ourselves Christians, let us put our money back on the ground and take up our cross for Christ. "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Matt. 6:21, NIV).

TNC Offers Training For Home Schoolers

Nine families participated in the first Home Schoolers Conference sponsored by Trevecca Nazarene College July 30-August 3, according to Ed Whittington, Director of Teacher Workshops and Special Programs. The conference was a spin-off of TNC's annual teacher workshops which attracted more than 600 students during the summer.

Citing a need for home-schooling parents to be

better prepared, Whittington said the conference was designed to provide parents with basic skills in methods of teaching. The week-long conference included sessions on teaching math, science, language arts, physical education, and other subjects.

Tennessee law allows parents to teach their children at home through the eighth grade. While the parents are not required to have

a college degree or any education training, the state does require parents to register their children with the local school district, and students must pass annual achievement

"This is scary to me," Whittington said concerning a parent teaching children without any training. "These are future citizens and wage earners who will have to rub shoulders with the community as a whole."





Bruce Hornsby's "A Night On The Town"

From the first song, "A Night on the Town" reveals a new, more aggressive pop sound from this piano balladeer who gave us such hits as "The Way it is" and "Valley Road." Unfortunately, this "top forty" approach to song-writing doesn't seem to suit Hornsby very well. Songs like "Stranded on Easy Street," "Stander on the Mountain," and "Special Night," deal with such tired themes as "boy meets girl," nostalgia for "glory days," and "boy meets girl, boy becomes a man." Other cuts, such as "Fire on the Cross" and "Barren Ground,"

which deal with the issues of racism and environmental irresponsibility, still lack something we have come to expect from Bruce Hornsby's music.

What is that something that is missing on this album (excuse me, CD)? I think what is missing here is Hornsby's piano. Sure, he plays it on every song, but, with the exception of "These Arms of Mine" and a "solo" on "Special Night," the characteristic Bruce Hornsby "sound" is either missing or lost somewhere in the mix.

There are, however, a couple of "bright lights in the darkness" on this album

(sorry, I can't get used to saying CD). Hornsby's duet with singer/songwriter Shawn Colvin (a bright new songstress whose solo album blows Bruce's away) on "Lost Soul," a haunting ballad about a man alone "somewhere between two worlds," along with the single "Across the River" and "These Arms of Mine," saves this CD from being just another boring top forty release. Maybe next time, Hornsby will forget about selling records spend more time creating the kind of innovative music we have come to expect from him.

Diamonds may be a girl's best friend but sapphires, rubies, emeralds, and garnets run a close second. However, these stones usually only find their way to our hands after expensive purchases at jewelry stores. Right? Well, not any longer.

Russ and Candy Burris are providing their patrons with fun, excitement, and possibly some valuable gems. Located at the Nashville Flea Market on Murfreesboro road, Prospector's Paradise is a local venture that provides ordinary people with the opportunity to "pan" for precious gemstones.

Four years ago, Burris found himself retired and yet not ready to stop working. He was introduced to the sport of "rock hounding" by some friends who lived near a gem stone mine in Alabama. Leery at first, Burris later recognized the past time to be both fun and profitable. After discovering some very precious gems, Burris looked for a way to share his discover-

ies with others.

After contacting a mine in North Carolina, the most gem rich state in the union, Burris purchased 40,000 pounds of gem rich soil. His business here in Nashville enables customers to sift through bags or buckets of this soil and "prospect" for small pieces of "paradise." After a rough stone is found, Burris then examines the piece and suggests how to best utilize the stone.

Once you have been advised upon the quality of the find, you can opt to send the rough stone to be cut and faceted. A second company is then engaged to mount the newly cut gem in a set of your choice

But perhaps you are not interested in acquiring any new jewelry. Prospector's Paradise does provide an evening of inexpensive entertainment. It is exciting to sift through the pan and look for precious stones. Whether or not you ever actually do anything with your find, the fun is in the prospecting!

Tennis Championship

If anybody had told a skinny 19 year old named Pete Sampras that he would defeat in turn Thomas Muster, Ivan Lendl, John McEnroe and Andre Agassi to capture the 1990 US Open Men's Singles Championship, he probably would have laughed. But not only did he win it, he did it in a startling convincingly manner - crushing teen-idol Agassi in the most lopsided final (6-4, 6-3, 6-2) since the ageing Lendl hammered Miloslav Mecir in

1986. The question is how and why, but that soon becomes obvious once one witnesses his consistently timed 120 mph service and brilliant volleys that put paid to 3 of the world's best baseliners and in John McEnroe probably the best touch player. A natural serve and volleyer with excellent groundstrokes, Sampras is the complete all-court player. Going into the final a slight underdog after Agassi had used a fearsome

forehand to pummel defending champion Boris Becker in 4 comfortable sets, Sampras soon made a mockery of his 12th seeding and turned the All-American encounter into a mismatch. From the outset Sampras was too quick, too talented and forceful for a sluggish Agassi who was only made to look slower by a serve that aced him 13 times. Resigned to defeat early in the third set by a player who had

been playing in his colorful shadows up until now, the Nick Bollitein protegy could only look on in astonishment and mutter between points "why are you so slow?"

Maybe Agassi is not the superstar he and a lot of others thought he was, particularly after convincing losses in 2 grand slam finals this year. Maybe Boris Becker is beginning to lose the edge that had him routed for a cer-

tain No. 1 spot for many years to come. Maybe John McEnroe in his thirties really has matured and has his mind clear after years of niggling self-doubt. And maybe, just maybe, the laconic, modest 1990 US Open Champion who bedazzled all with dominating tennis will create the 1990's as the era of Pete Sampras. After Flushing Meadow, who's to say what he won't do?

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

One of the greatest deterrents facing TNC athletes this fall semester is an ugly word called "ineligibility." For those athletes faced by this frustrating problem this fall represents little more than a time of disillusionment, a time to struggle to keep fit and a time to wonder if anybody really cares about their sporting prowess. Under a newly introduced NAIA ruling in July, any athlete who enters school in mid-year (January), has to take the ridiculous amount of 24 hours in order to be eligible for the following semester.

Now who can humanly take 24 hours in one semester is a question nobody can answer. Quite simply it is a ludicrous situation and one which appears that nobody could benefit from. In the future, student athletes have the advantage of being aware and hence able to take summer school classes, but for those already ineligible there is precious little comfort. Why was this rule introduced? To stop athletes entering in the spring semester and surprising all, hence affecting the ranking systems and making it "inconvenient" for the NAIA hi-

erarchy? Or was it to deter international students from entering the college system at this time, and making it more difficult for them to enter the NAIA at all? Whatever their reasoning it would appear to me that prejudice has overridden proper reasoning and judgment to leave athletes—and only the athletes—in a no-win situation that I, frankly, cannot understand in the slightest. . . .

The first time one hears about Youth In Missions, the concept of sacrifice begins to build. 



Administratium *the Discovery*

Once upon a time in the recent future, the heaviest element known to science was discovered by scientists at Generic College. The element, tentatively named Administratium (AD), has no protons or electrons, which means its atomic number is 0. However, it does have 1 neutron, 125 assistants to the neutron, 75 vice-neutrons and 111 assistants to the vice-neutrons. This gives it an atomic mass of 312. The 312 particles are held together in the nucleus by a force that involves the continuous exchange of meson-like particles called memo-ons according to Dr. Ozone. The variety found at GC appears to be an early form in the evolution of the element.

However, according to Professor Potassium it appears to need as many memo-ons as does the fully evolved element.

Since it has no electrons, Administratium is inert. However, it can be detected chemically because it seems to impede every reaction in which it is present. According to Dr. Nitrogen, one of the discoverers of the element, very small amounts of Administratium caused a reaction that normally takes less than a second to take more than four days.

Administratium has a half-life of approximately three years, at which time it does not actually decay. Instead, it undergoes a reorganization in which assistants to the vice-neutrons exchange places.

Some studies have indicated that the atomic mass number actually increases after each reorganization.

Administratium was discovered accidentally when Dr. Choleric dumped all of the contents of her desk top into the intake hatch of the College's particle accelerator. "Apparently, the keys, etc. with the particles in the accelerator created the new element," Professor Potassium explained.

Research at other laboratories seems to indicate that Administratium might occur naturally in the atmosphere. According to one scientist, Administratium is most likely to be found on college and university campuses, near the best-appointed and best-maintained buildings.
