

# President's Home to Become Relaxation Center

In a joint venture between the Administration and the ASNNC, what used to be the home of the NNC President will this term be transformed into a center for student relaxation and recreation.

The \$60,000 home located Next to Dooley Hall has been approved for student use on an experimental basis. "How it is used this term will be used in the future," said one administrative official.

A "home atmosphere" to which students can retreat in the evenings is the main attraction of the home which will probably house TV and stereo rooms in the upstairs and ping pong, pool, fooseball and vending

facilities downstairs.

Currently being sought is a college couple to move into the house and oversee activities.

The Administration is providing the house, paying utilities, and will provide one-half

the salary of the couple, while the ASNNC will provide equipment and pay the other half of the salary. The Senate is reportedly planning to establish a committee to develop guidelines for the utilization of the home.

### CWB Aids Church in Burns

It is 4:30 on a sleepy Saturday afternoon in Burns, Oregon.

Two cars, loaded down with 10 NNC students and their luggage, pull up to a partially finished church building. There is one last moment of silence, and then a flurry of hastily opening and slamming car doors and excited students interrupt the tranquil scene.

So began the CWB Burns Project which took place during spring break.

The 10 students, Keri Weed, Gwen Scott, Lavonna Highes, Bob Wells, Dennis Trepanier, Marv Peters, Jeff Moos, Ron Kirk, Dave Edgerly and Randy Anderson found themselves involved in a variety of tasks over the short but active week.

Presently, the Burns Nazarenes worship in a church which they share with Seventh Day Adventists. But, they want a church of their own, and they are building one--big enough to seat

500.

Thus, the group's activities included roofing, handing insulation, and hauling natural rock from the nearby desert to face the exterior of the church. Besides helping with these jobs, the 3 girls plastered cracks in an old parsonage. Originally, the girls were going to paint.

"We were well-received, and well-fed," Randy Anderson said of the trip.

Gwen Scott, also a member of the group, said that the people in Burns were "terrific," and that she will remember the party's teamwork.

"We could all work together so 'neat,' and had a good feeling of closeness," she said.

The church, under construction for almost a year, should be finished by June or July, and its pastor, Reverend Kenneth Coil, will dedicate the building in September.

## Greathouse Interviewed

The following is an interview with Dr. William Greathouse, President of Nazarene Theological Seminary. He is on the NNC campus as the Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecturer, and was interviewed Wednesday by Marv Belzer, Rod Leupp, and Terry Mattson.

CRUSADER: You made the statement that there are two classes of church members, those under law and those under grace. Do you think that is an oversimplification; are there any "shades of gray" in between?

GREATHOUSE: Yes. The same person can be partially under law and partially under grace. These are logical categories, but not absolute categories in experience. Ideally, we should be living fully in grace.

CRUSADER: Perhaps the question that should be asked first is to define law.

GREATHOUSE: Paul is talking about the Torah, the law of God in the Old Testament, the Mosaic law which includes both the covenant of grace and the moral law of the Ten Commandments. For Paul the law usually stands for a humanistic religion where my confidence is in my own moral ability. We aren't saved by the law; we are saved by grace, but grace enables us then to keep the law. We work out what God first works in; unless we work out what God works in we frustrate grace. It's just a cheap grace unless it becomes a way of life in which we actually work out in love deeds of kindness and love our brother in concrete ways.

CRUSADER: In a faith based on grace does the law still have any value to the Christian?

GREATHOUSE: It does have a value in the Christian life. It make explicit the way love will

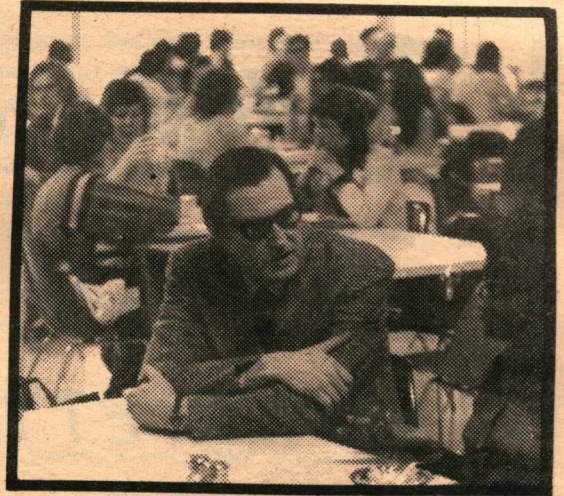
express itself.

CRUSADER: A part of our relationship with God, built upon grace, is the observation of the law.

GREATHOUSE: Right, it is a voluntary acceptance thoughr the power of the Spirit, to live out this life that Christ has defined, and which he himself incarnated. Within the life of grace we fulfill the law of Christ. There is a law over my life now. It is the law of Christ, which has been lived out in the life of Christ. That is law; it is commanding. It is not just good advice; it is the will of God for me. Christ was not a new legalist. He was stating a new law which transcends law. The law of love is Christ's law.

CRUSADER: When a person comes to realize that in himself he is not sufficient to achieve salvation, because he cannot fulfill the law, he becomes morally impotent and divided against himself. How then does he reach out and accept the grace of God, if he's at such a point where he is despairing over his ability to do anything? How does he reach out to God's grace?

GREATHOUSE: The Spirit has to help him to turn in total reliance upon Christ. If you don't have



faith, preach it, talk it, share it, until the Spirit leads you to that point where you can really give your own witness that you have found in Christ hope and salvation and deliverance. Pray for saving faith, pray for the faith that will enable you to trust in Christ. Faith is a gift of the Spirit. God can't believe for you; you believe as his Spirit enables you to believe.

CRUSADER: Does a Christian walking in grace, trying to fulfill the law of Christ, have to make value judgments? Is there a dynamic will of the Christian in making value judgments in situations?

GREATHOUSE: That's where the Holy Spirit (Continued on page 8)

# Resident Hall Applicants to Undergo Screening Process

Applicants for resident hall positions next year will be interviewed Tuesday and Wednesday.

"It is imperative that all interested students have applications in the Student Affairs Office by Monday," says Vice-President for Student Affairs Rev. Irving Laird. Applicants will schedule an appointment when they submit the applications which are available in the same office.

In all thirty-six positions in campus residence halls will be filled. Three resident directors, seven resident assistants, and twenty-six wing assistants are to be chosen.

Payment for the jobs ranges from free room and board plus \$100 a month for resident directors to that of wing assistants who will have to pay only one-half the normal room charges per term. Resident assistants will

receive free room and board and \$100 per term.

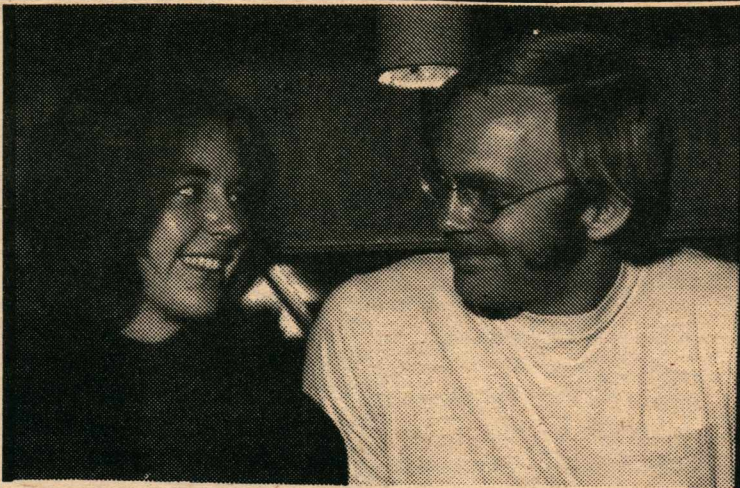
Single students 19 years and older with a GPA of at least 2.00 are eligible to make application for the wing assistant positions. Resident assistants should be at least 21 years old. Resident directors must be married and at least 22 years old, although Laird said that age requirements may be waived if necessary to fill the positions.

In the future students with experience as wing assistants will have a better chance at the better-paying jobs that those without it. "The resident directors and resident assistants in following years will be selected from those who have had experience as wing assistants," Laird said.

Last Wednesday enough applications had not been received to fill all the wing assistant spots.

Training for all those selected will begin April 15 and run for the next five Monday nights. The training of residence hall personnel will take place for the first time at NNC and is being instituted with the revisions in dorm administration.

The Bill Gaither Trio will appear in concert Thursday, April 11, at 7:30 p.m. in NNC's P. E. Building.

From Alexandria, Indiana, the trio is composed of Bill Gaither, one of America's foremost gospel song writers; Bill's wife, Gloria; and his brother.

For four straight years Bill Gaither has received the highest honor presented by the Gospel Music Association of America -- the Dove Award as the Gospel Music Song Writer of the Year. Best-known of his many songs is "He Touched Me," recently cited as the song which had more impact on the listening public than any other song in the nation. Other more

recent Gaither songs which are being widely received by audiences coast to coast are "The King Is Coming," "Because He Lives," "Get All Excited," and "There's Something About That Name."

Among the highlights of each concert are the dialogue by Gloria, author of "Make Warm Noises," as she shares her insights into family living as it relates to God's love; and the solo performances of Dan Gaither, recognized as one of the finest tenors in America.

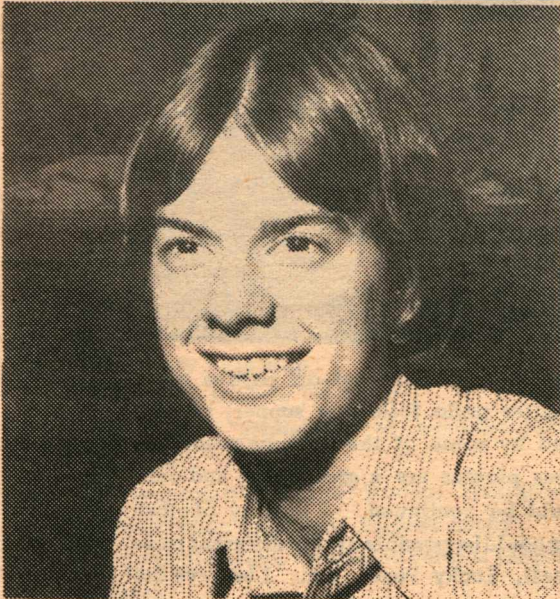

During my two years in the senate, I have become acquainted with the major aspects of student government. I am versed in the use of senate procedure; am experienced in working with most of the student services offered by ASNNC; am knowledgeable on many of the issues that will confront the senate in the next year and am aware of the duties of the executive vice-president.

Platform.

To many people, the role of ASNNC Executive Vice-President is merely that of acting as Chairman of the Senate. His job, however, covers a lot more. The following ideas for improvement are directly related to areas affected by the office of Executive Vice-President.

- I. Clarify, update, and publicize student and Administrative positions on:
  - a.) Dorm Hours
  - b.) Disciplinary Procedures
  - c.) Student Rights
- II. Increase support for the ASNNC Judicial Board.
- III. The activities and services of the ASNNC Counsel, the student legal service for disciplinary cases, should be increasingly publicized.
- IV. Improve organization of Religious Life on campus through monthly meetings of the class and dorm chaplains, the Presidents and Advisors of CWB, GMS, and CMA with the Executive Vice-President and Dr. DuBois.
- V. Continuous input to members of all student influence committees from all areas of student interest.
- VI. Increase usage of KCRH in areas such as academic training in broadcasting, campus news, contemporary entertainment and coverage of special ASNNC events.

Variety in Chapel. Wednesday chapels could greatly be improved by adding more variety by involving more student organizations in the presentations and by varying the structure and agenda.

Atmosphere of Cooperation. I will work with student leaders and administrators to strive to create an atmosphere of cooperation in which student rights are respected and constructive change can occur.

Senate Leadership. I believe that the executive vice-president should not only be an arbitrator, keeping order and preventing disputes, but he should also be a leader among the senators, i.e., helping them with the strategy they should use to most effectively reach their objectives. Saying it in sports terminology, I will double as a coach and a referee.

Student Services that Serve Students. Student government exists primarily for the purpose of providing services for the student body. As executive vice-president, I will constantly strive, as all student leaders should, to be aware of the effectiveness of student services. I will do everything within my power to insure that all student services truly serve the students.

Spiritual Leadership. The spiritual life of our campus must always be the executive vice-president's top priority. As the elected spiritual leader, I will endeavor through all my actions and decisions in student government to reflect my concern for the spiritual welfare of our campus.

Do you agree with those who contend that the ASNNC is becoming gradually too much of a bureaucracy?

ASNNC does indeed have an abundance of offices, especially in the executive branch. In some cases, however, specifically in the office of Vice-President for Community Relations, the work load exceeds the capability of the workers. If anything in Student Life matters, students can influence and improve in far more areas than are now being affected. Thus the so-called "ASNNC Bureaucracy" does have room for increased service.

ASNNC is at a point now where it can either balloon into a bureaucracy or continue as an effective governing body. I will do everything in my power as executive vice-president to keep ASNNC relevant to the needs of the students.

Should the ASNNC join National Student Lobby next year?

Yes, definitely. Being a private school, NNC tends to be hidden from public view. For not only recruitment purposes, but to obtain national input and improve the national status of NNC, any and every outside organization or activity should be used.

No, through ASNNC's membership in ISGA next year we will be indirectly represented in NSL. Therefore, I do not feel that the additional expense of our direct joining is warranted.

What do you foresee as happening in ASNNC convocations next year?

Convocations, being the controversy that they are, should be constantly revamped and improved. Two additional areas should be looked into. First, presentation could be made by NNC faculty who have new innovations in their specific field. Second, additional allotments toward nationally known speakers to talk on topics pertinent to NNC students.

Here I would like to enlarge upon the first point of my platform. Last year Wednesday convocations were reorganized to be student-run religious chapels under the direction of the executive vice-president. This year I would like to involve more student organizations such as forensics and Piccadilly Players in the presentation of programs. I would work with them helping them to present different and innovative programs. Also, I propose that several times during this year there be two separate chapel services conducted simultaneously from which students can choose the one that is most appealing to them.

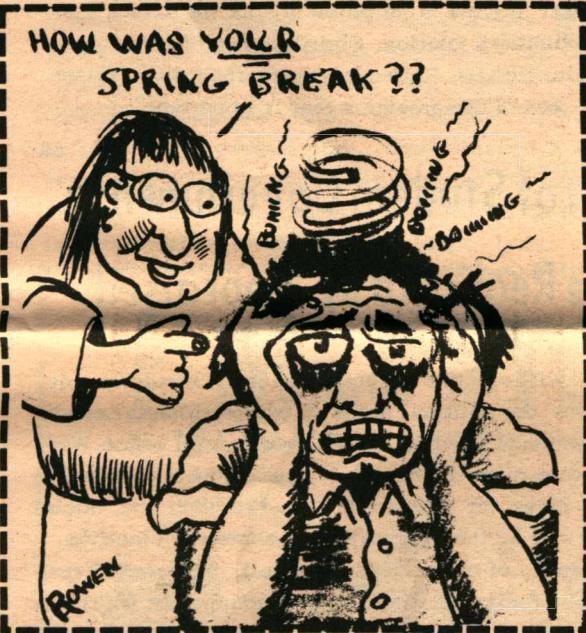

Do you plan any major changes within the scope of the office of the ASNNC President?

The change in the scope of the office which I would like to effect is to channel the efforts of student government towards the pertinent issues. The office must work very

close as a guiding post to the Senate in order to keep the objective of the Executive Branch and the Senate in perspective.

Do you agree with those who contend that the ASNNC is becoming gradually too much of a bureaucracy?

Those who contend that the ASNNC is becoming too much of a bureaucracy are usually referring to the seeming ineffectiveness of our large student government organization. The point is well taken that we must work to reach maximum efficiency within our structure to avoid becoming what many connote with the word bureaucracy, and that's inefficiency.

Should the ASNNC join National Student Lobby next year?

I am in favor of joining the National Student Lobby, but in a different way than has been done traditionally. The Idaho Student Government Association is proposing to join various national student organizations. By being members of the reorganized ISGA we will also gain the advantage of attaining membership in the Idaho Student Press Club and the National Student Lobby. The only concession on our part is that it will require an increase in ISGA dues from \$50 to \$100. Yet, this would still be quite a savings as compared to the \$150 needed to join NSL alone.

What do you foresee as happening in ASNNC convocations next year?

I would like to use some of the extraneous ASNNC convocation sessions for a type of forum debate. These would be debates on very current and pertinent issues to the student body. Possible suggestions for topics are formal vs. informal SLEC hearings, pros and cons to open houses, etc.

Candidates for ASNNC Executive Vice-President and Vice-President for Social Life will engage in a forum Wednesday at 9 a. m. in Feltar Lecture Hall.

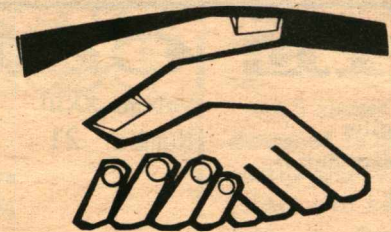
Billy Green is 13 years old.

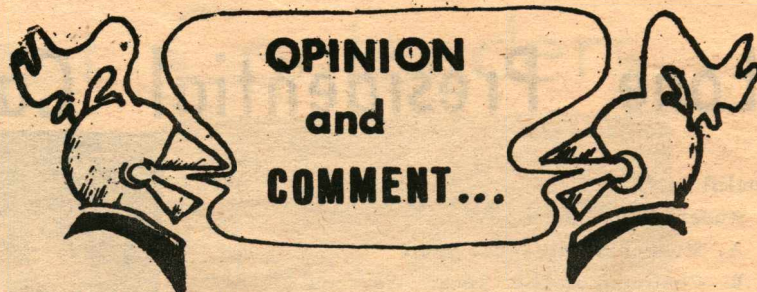

Just before spring break, NNC was the host of the Idaho Special Olympics. This was a track meet of sorts: children and young adults with handicaps ranging from emotional problems to mental and physical deficiencies competed with each other in a wide variety of sports. There were wrestlers, basketball players and swimmers. For many, it was the high point of the year, if not of their lives. This was their chance to show the world what they could do.

I had the privilege of helping in the swimming events. I had to re-arrange my finals, taking them before the Friday afternoon opening ceremony. But it was a small price to pay. It seems hard to believe that, in the past, people with physical and mental problems were exiled, enslaved, punished, imprisoned, and even killed for conditions and events beyond their control. People were literally driven insane by a "sane" inhuman society, because they couldn't control their speech.

These thoughts went through my mind as a sole trumpet player played our National Anthem. The comparison of "normal" people and these "special" people continued. Looking over the crowd, I did not see one sad face. Every heart was covered. They were all standing. I looked back on some of the things I had

done during past anthems and a chill swept over me. I suddenly felt rather ashamed and embarrassed.

Later, one man in the swimming competition was to stick in my mind. He used two canes to walk. He needed help in almost everything he did. But he was there to compete, and compete he did. Just before his heat in the 25-yard free-style, he literally crawled the last few feet to the edge of the pool. Sitting on the side as the gun went off, his dive was simply falling into the water. And it was as if he had become a fish. He swam the whole distance in form equivalent to that of a Junior Life Saver.

He didn't come in first, but you couldn't tell that from the smile on his face. Taking five minutes to walk back the same 25 yards it had taken him 30 seconds to swim, I could not help but share in his victory. He had done what he had come to do. He had finished. Nothing could have taken his joy from him--the joy of simply finishing the race.

As the trumpet finished its last note, the crowd exploded once again, but people seemed silent. It was as if the world was not listening. These handicapped people were here for two days of publicity and were expected to vanish again. "Don't bother us, let us forget you. You make us uncomfortable when you're around."

It's now over, but here is one person who will not forget them. And here is one person who will continually feel uncomfortable in trying to feel superior to others. This is because I have not come close to experiencing the joy that they had, during their Special Olympics.

## Impact of Student Government Must Be Realistically Appraised

The ASNNC will elect its executive leaders Thursday despite withdrawals from the political scene of two presidential candidates and one who had filed for a vice-presidential office. With only one candidate running for each of four of the six executive positions, the races for Executive Vice-President and Social Vice-President will be the only officially contested elections.

Why the scarcity of office-seekers? Well, for personal reasons mainly. The feeling that student government just isn't, for me, worth the effort. For most students, government is not the major interest which would impel one to seek an executive office, and it should not be.

However there is a sense in which student government is the business of everybody. For one thing, all students pay at least \$36 a year to the ASNNC. Student government is always potentially a means for reform and the provision of valuable student services. Student government at NNC has been eager to play a role in life at NNC--witness airport bussing; refrigerators in rooms; investigative committees on job placement, social life, representation on academic councils, dorm hours; the book exchange; and so on.

By attempting to be effective, ASNNC government has created many offices and committee spots, over 80 in all. The organized ASNNC does not exist to fill those offices, but in order to achieve the purposes it has set, it must do so.

Student government will not be worth one's effort if it is pursued for the wrong reasons, like for glainor, or if it is taken as an end in itself. Even so, the positions allow NNC students the chance to engender improvements in campus life. It is not hard to draw a crowd if someone has dirty socks to air. To work consistently for improvement is, as we all know, another story.

Instead of bemoaning the fact that the executive elections will not be their usual breathtaking selves, it is incumbent upon NNC students to consider their own particular role in the life of the community.

NNC basketball star Raynor Rumpel has been busy collecting post-season awards, the latest being his selection to the Nazarene Athletic Association all-star team. Rumpel had previously earned first-team All-District and second-team All-Northwest recognition.

Joining the 6-5 senior on the All-Nazarene team were Steve Endresen and Art Larson of Point Loma, Ralph Hodge and Jim Shoff of Olivet, Jeff Jantz and Bobby Martin of Bethany, Rick Reyenger of Eastern, Ralph Watson of Trevecca and Ron Yantis of Mid-America.

An exciting NCAA basketball tournament crowned a new champion for the first time in eight years as North Carolina St. methodically (and a little sloppily) defeated Marquette. The final was obviously anticlimactic since the "real" championship had already occurred two days before when the much-revered UCLA dynasty was ended after 50 furious minutes that had this reporter nearly melting in his chair. After brashly predicting a Wolfpack victory in an earlier Crusader, my heart was in my mouth when UCLA ran off seven straight points at the beginning of the second overtime. Surely, I thought, the Bruins couldn't blow another big lead like they had earlier. But a couple David Thompson "alley-oops" later it was all over. In what must have been one of the most evenly-matched finals in many years, I feel the key to State's win was Tom (really 7-2½) Burlison's improvement and Monte (really 5-5½) Towe's ballhandling as much as Thompson's overall play. When the two teams met last December, Bill Walton dominated Burlison, ignoring his height advantage. But Tall Tom was better this time (20 points, 14 rebounds), although still not in Walton's class.

# Thinclads Open With Promise

The NNC track and field team has gotten off to a fairly promising start with some good performances in three meets so far.

The squad kicked off their year March 9 at Salem in the Oregon Relays. The two mile team of Steve Hills, Randy Fox, Sid Sever and Dick Huling took

first place with a time of 8:08.0. Steve Wolfe, Doug Beggs and Mike Gilbert put together long jumps of 21'6 1/2" 20'4 3/4" and 20'3 1/2" to win the long jump relay by 3 1/2' with a combined 62'2 1/2". The mile relay team of Hills, Huling, Dave Streight and Rex Rosenbaum came second in

3:21.7. The Crusaders also took places in the 440 and sprint medley (220, 110, 110, 440) relays with fifth and seventh, respectively.

Next came the Martin Relays in Walla Walla where the distance medley (440, 880, 1320, mile) team grabbed second behind powerful Boise State with a time of 10:36.6. Steve Hills 1320 leg of 3:08 keyed the NNC effort. The Crusaders added fifths in the 440 and mile relays and a sixth in the 880 baton event.

Last Saturday Coach Paul Taylor took a squad of six men to compete at Southern Idaho, the team being depleted due to spring break. Nevertheless, Steve Hills scored a double win in the mile-880 with 4:27 and 2:00.3. Roger Schmidt took a 2nd in the pole vault with a 13'6" jump, Steve Wolfe, although hampered by an injury, triple-jumped 42'10" for second and Sid Sever took third in the 880 in 2:07.

Tomorrow the thinclads travel to Boise for the BSU Invitational in their first meet with full representation. The meet will be highlighted by a special 25-kilometer (15.5 mile) run.

# Baseball Squad Drops First Five

The NNC baseball team has gotten off to a somewhat disappointing start this season, having dropped its first five games of the year.

The Crusader nine opened its season March 22-23 with a pair of doubleheaders at Klamath Falls, Oregon. Oregon Tech dumped NNC 6-4 and 5-2 and Willamette was even less kind, taking 10-1 and 9-0 decisions. Neil Castle was the leading Crusader hitter with 4 in the four games, but it was not nearly enough. OIT's Jack Jahl was especially damaging to NNC, connecting for a homer in each game.

Last Tuesday NNC made its home diamond debut against C of I and seemed to have matters well in hand through eight innings, during which they compiled a 3-1 lead, aided by John Meyer's homerun. But the Coyotes exploded for seven runs in the ninth and held on for a 8-4 victory. It was C of I's first win in seven starts and NNC's fifth straight loss.

This weekend the Crusaders compete in the annual College Baseball Classic, with three games in Boise and the final contest at Rodeo Park here in Nampa.

A "Tonight Show" in the P. E. Building and pizza party in Saga Thursday night will kick things off.

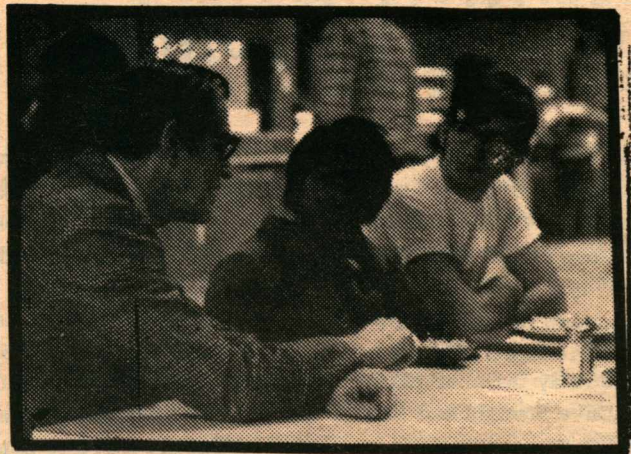

has to give specific direction. The new law is not a detailed description of every kind of situation you'll meet. That was what happened in the case of the old law. The new law is essentially the law of love. Many of the things Jesus said are illustrations of how this law operates in a given context.

## Lecturer Stands Firm in Biblical Theology

You get a clear directive as to what love will do in a set of circumstances.

CRUSADER: Should the responsibility primarily be left up to the individual Christian, and God, so that each Christian makes a value judgment, or is there a role that a collective body of Christians can play?

GREATHOUSE: The Biblical ethic is a social ethic; a community ethic. Every man doesn't go off on his own horse as a lone ranger, to decide what's right and wrong. That is an unrealistic position that has never characterized the Church at any period.

CRUSADER: Do you think that "dying out to self" is misinterpreted? If so, how is it misinterpreted?

GREATHOUSE: Yes it is. It becomes an inverted type of self-salvation. You're sanctified by your

killing of yourself. It's rather like I'm proud of my humility.

CRUSADER: As President of a theological seminary, do you find yourself constantly having to rework your theology in terms of new materials you come across in your reading, or as you sense the times around you changing?

GREATHOUSE: Theology is a task never done. But as a Biblical theologian, I read everything through the eyes of Scripture as the touchstone so that I'm not blown about by every wind of doctrine.

CRUSADER: The Church of the Nazarene is avowedly evangelical. What message do evangelicals have to share; what void can they fill?

GREATHOUSE: The evangelical commission is to share the gospel, the good news of life through Christ, which means personal and social wholeness. We have kept our light under a bushel.

## Summer Ministries Applicants to be Interviewed

Students applying for the Northwest summer ministries inner-city team will be interviewed Monday. Applications should be in the Student Affairs Office in the Administration Building by Monday noon. Interviews will run from 1:30 p. m. until 3:15 p. m.

Four students will be selected to assist this summer a church with a ministry to people in the inner-city, perhaps in Portland,

Oregon. "There is a good possibility that Portland will be the city," Rev. Irving Laird, Vice-President for Student Affairs, said Wednesday. If Portland is selected, students will work with Portland First Church of the Nazarene.

Participants will take a week off for training in Nashville, Tennessee, immediately after third term, meeting with all students in the Nazarene

inner-city ministries program.
