and I will attend to the windows and the baskets." Glory to God! I think He has just opened a window from what I feel. Now I want to celebrate and I will praise His name forever. I am so glad that I have put Him to the test and found by actual experience what I had always believed, namely, that His promises are yea and amen. He fills me now while I write. Reader, may you determine now to become a tither from this moment so long as yon live.

In conclusion we will notice some of the objections urged , against this custom, will speak of some of the excellent features connected with it, and answer some questions sometimes asked by candid inquirers. The objection that it is Judaism has already been answered. Others urge that under the Chr tian system we are commanded to give all. This is true in the sense that we are required to devote ourselves and all we have to His service, but it is equally true that He requires all our time, but in a peculiar sense, He commands us to keep one day in seven holy, it is the Lord's. So also, while He requires us to hold all of our substance at His disposal, He simply asks us to set aside His tenth as a kind of rental to be payed for the use of His property. Those who make much ado about ""conscience" and "giving all," usually do not give a tenth. Another objects; "I give more than a tenth now," well, then, try a tenth and you will gain by the transaction, or what is more likely, find that you have not given a tenth. "But I cannot afford it," says one. That is, in effect, to say, I cannot afford to be honest. We could not think much of a tenant who ran off from a benevoieut handlord without settling his rent. But if you refuse to titne, you refuse to pay the rent that God asks for the use of all His property. Let us be honest.

But some one says; "That is all right for the rich and well-to-do, but poor people would be Surdened by k." This is to impugn the goodness and justice of God, who requires it of all alike and rob the poor of the privilege of meeting at God's altar, on a common level, every other debtor to their great and good Master. Every objection which has been urged against tithing can be traced back to a source which makes it hard to give to God at all.

Some of the advantages are:

I. It puts every man on a common level and equality.

2. It is proportionate giving, and takes the responsibility off of man because he gives back God honestly, one tenth of what God gives him. So all may give in proportion to their income. There are many wealthy persons who ought not to be content with the tithe, but should give a third or half, or even more. But the tenth is the basis.

3. It is systematic giving. Many people have no system in their giving, hence cannot tell what they have done or can do. They simply give what they may chance to have on hand, or what is the same thing virtually, give what is left after every selfer wish and desire is

gratified. I call you to note the fact that you usually give your dogs what is left, but (I speak it softly) you surely will not treat the Lord of heaven and earth as you do your dog? The way out is to give systematically by giving a tenth. It is surprising how much persons of even modest means can contribute when once they begin to be honest with God.

4. It makes you more economical with all you have for you realize that you are dealing with property of which you are not the sole owner, but with God's property who furnishes you with everything and regards you as His steward. The Lord help us to be honest. By this method and system your financial affairs are more carefully looked after, resulting in better management and greater prosperity, so that you find yourself getting along better on *nine-tenths* than you formerly did on *all*. This is the human side of why men prosper more financially under this system than before but the greatest reason is the especial blessing of God on obedience.

5. Another thing in its favor is that those who once *begin* scarcely ever *cease* to tithe. If they do their testimony is to both financial and spiritual loss. Personally, it has been a great blessing to me, and I would not cease to tithe for anything, and with my light on the subject could no more use the Lord's tenth on *myself* than I could put my hand in another man's pocket and take *hus* money and use it.

I make no quarrel with those who do not see it as I do, but only speak my convictions. Finally, let me try to make plain what tithing means. Does it mean one-tenth of what is left after our expenses are paid? By no means. One-tenth of all a man gains on his capital, whether of wages or salary, from products, business or interest on money loaned or which ought to be loaned, belongs to God and the expenses of making are charged to yourself and not to Him. To make the matter plain, a man makes \$6.00 or \$30.00 per week, whatever amount, one-tenth of it belongs to God, He pays for all His expenses in making it Himself. All that the farmer makes, whether corn, oats, wheat, cotton or stock, all his increase one-tenth is the Lord's. He pays expenses of running the farm. The business min pays one-tenth of the net income on capital invested and pays his own expenses. So with all manner of pursuits. One-tenth of all income and increase is the Lord's. The expenses are ours. This blessed old system can not be improved upon.

I can settle all the problems of finance and world evangelism which confronts the church today. It would add more than thirty million of dollars to the benevolent income of the Methodist Episcopal church, alone in a single year. Under this system every eleven families could support a minister as well as they support themselves and the minister would be able to give his tithe also. Let us write the emancipation proclamation of all the missionary *hens* now in service, and put a stop to our "broom-drills," "ice cream fetes," "straw

berry festivals," "old rummage sales," "socksolals," "bazaars," and the whole train of such God-dishonoring expedients for raising money for carrying on the work of the Lord, and let us just adopt the Divine plan of the ages, and be honest with God-give back His tenth and then all the "thank offerings" we can in addition. So shall we see all problims of finance swept away forever. Then there shall never be any lack of funds to carry on the work of the Lord. May the Lord of the tithe bless what I have written and may it lead many into the blessed company of those who bring all the tithes into the storehouse and receive the uncontainable blessing. Amen.

Systematic Benificence

Do we practice it? The various offerings of the Jews aggr gated nearly three-tenths of their income, and it looks like Christians with their vastly superior advantages might at least pay a tenth of their income to the Lord. All truly enlightened and spiritual people recognize that everything they have is the Lord's and should be used for His glory. Yet this does not prevent their setting apart a specific sum in proportion to their income for the Lord's treasury. After this has been done free will offerings can be made to any extent they may desire. But some one says: "O! I give more than a tithe but I do not keep any record." ' This is an easy way to dodge the issue and deceive yourself. Try proportionate giving and you will be surprised at the increase in the Lord's treasury. You will have something on hand for the Lord's work. The people who tithe are by far the most liberal givers. If the churches in England and America would tithe we could increase our missionary force two hundredfold, swelling the number of missionaries from six thousand to twelve hundred thousand, which would furnish every eight hundred of the heathen population a missionary and that would enable us to evangelize the world in a short time. Friend, try tithing as a basis of your paying to the Lord and you will be surprised at the large increase of your contributions. You can give the tenth of your income to missions and theu add as much thereto as you desire in the way of free-will offerings. Let I Cor. 16:2, be the measure of your gifts.

Sensible Advice

The Bible boldly and fearlessly preached would revolutionize this world. Such puny creatures as we are do not need to apologize for it, much less criticise it as some of the conceited and oversmart are doing today. It has run the gauntlet of hell's bitterest attacks unscathed and is more widely circulated and read today than ever before. If they think that religion should be more scientific let them acquaint us with a power which produces an effect-that is science. If they want to be up to date let them get after the devil, for he keeps about as nearly up to date as anybody that we know of in this world. If they think there are more good people outside of the church than in it let them organize cottage prayer-meetings and missionary bands among these outside saints and set them to praying and working for the coming of the kindom."

"We have been 'decorated' lately with not little abuse by some so-called 'free-thinkers because we have at various times spoken in commendation of the Bible, and particularly because we have expressed our belief that under certain conditions it may be read with profit in the public schools. We shall make no reply to these attacks because, in the first place, they are couched in terms that make them unworthy of a reply, and, secondly, because we propose to continue our approval of the Bible whenever occasion seems to demand such approval. While this is a secular journal, it is also a journal that believes in the Bible, and in the religion which the Bible teaches, and is glad, when opportunity offers, to help along any of the many noble causes to which the churches, of all names and sects, are committed. We may say here, also, while we are in the way for it, that we have infinitely more respect for any man who sincerely holds to a belief in some form of religion, and lives up to its precepts as best he can, whether he be a Mohammedan, a Buddhist, or a Hottentot, than we have for these shallow and blatant irreconcilables and iconoclasts who, while living in a land which owes its strength and prosperity chiefly to the principles and influences of a great religious faith, are doing all they can in their feeble and ineffectual way to break down and destroy its faith."

THE FATAL CAUSE

The majority of professing Christians have very little interest in missions. They are so indifferent that they make no effort to inform themselves as to the needs of the heathen. gation gathered from among the heathen . The subject has never really been on their Now, what was the incentive for foreign misthemselves as to the needs of the heathen. hearts. Under some touching story or searching appeal they may have a little spasm of mission zeal, but for want of root it soon dies away and they sink down to the same dead level of self-centeredness. Some one says that the church's neglect to evangelize the heathen is "Christianity's Crime," but the real crime is not living the obedient, holy life, that would inevitably result in carrying the gospel to the uttermost parts of the earth (Acts. 1:8.) The providences of God have thrown the doors wide open but an apathetic church sits idly by, caring little and heeding less the golden opportunities that they are recklessly neglect ing. It is not a question of money. The church has horded its millions to gratify its own lusts.

The superficial, feeble, sickly life which we see among Christians all about us is the cause of the trouble. A strong spiritual life in the church would result in the evangelization

If one-fourth of the church membership would average a cent per day for missions it would increase the offering sixfold. The "poor dying rate" which fitly describes the life of so many, will never be felt as an evangelizing force either at home or abroad. Give the Holy Spirit right of way-let each member have his personal Pentecost, and the problem of world-wide witnessing is solved according to the words of Jesus in Acts 1:8. The truth is we don't love the Lord well enough to sacrifice for Him. John R. Mott says:

"The most striking example of achievement on the home field, in the interest of foreign missions, is that of the Moravians. They have done more, in proportion to their ability, than any other body of Christians. If members of Protestant Churches in Great Britain and America gave in like proportion, then missionary contributions would aggregate over £12,000,000, or a fourfold increase. And if they went out as missionaries in corresponding numbers, we would have a force of nearly 400,000 foreign workers, which is vastly more than the number of missionaries estimated as necessary to achieve the evangel-ization of the world. The question is, What is there in connection with the work which is not reproducible?"

The Secretary of the Board of Missions in the Moravian Church gives the secret of their remarkable Missionary activity in the following statement. Reader, prayerfully study it, and ask yourself, "How much do I love Jesus judging from my self-denial and activity Him?" The Secretary says:

"Even today the Moravians have for every fifty-eight communicants in the home chur es a missionary in the foreign field, and for every member in the home churches they have more than two members in the congresionary work which has produced such results? While acknowledging the supreme authority of the great commission, the Moravian Brethren have ever emphasized as their incentive the inspiring truth drawn from Isaiah 53:10-12: making our Lord's suffering the spur to all their activity. From that prophecy they drew their missionary battle-cry: 'To win for the Lamb that was slain, the reward of His sufferings.' We feel that we must compensate Him in some way for the awful sufferings which He endured in working out our salvation. The only way we can reward Him is by bringing souls to Him. When we bring Him souls, that is compensation for the tra-vail of His soul. In no other way can we so ffectively bring the suffering Savior the reward of His passion as by missionary labor, whether we go ourselves or enable others to go. Get this burning thought of 'personal love for the Savior who redeemed me' into the hearts of all Christians, and you have the most powerful incentive that can be had for missionary effort. Oh, if we could make this missionary problem a personal onel if we could fill the hearts of the people with a personal love for this Savior who died for them, the indifference of Christendom would disappear, and the kingdom of Christ would ap-
